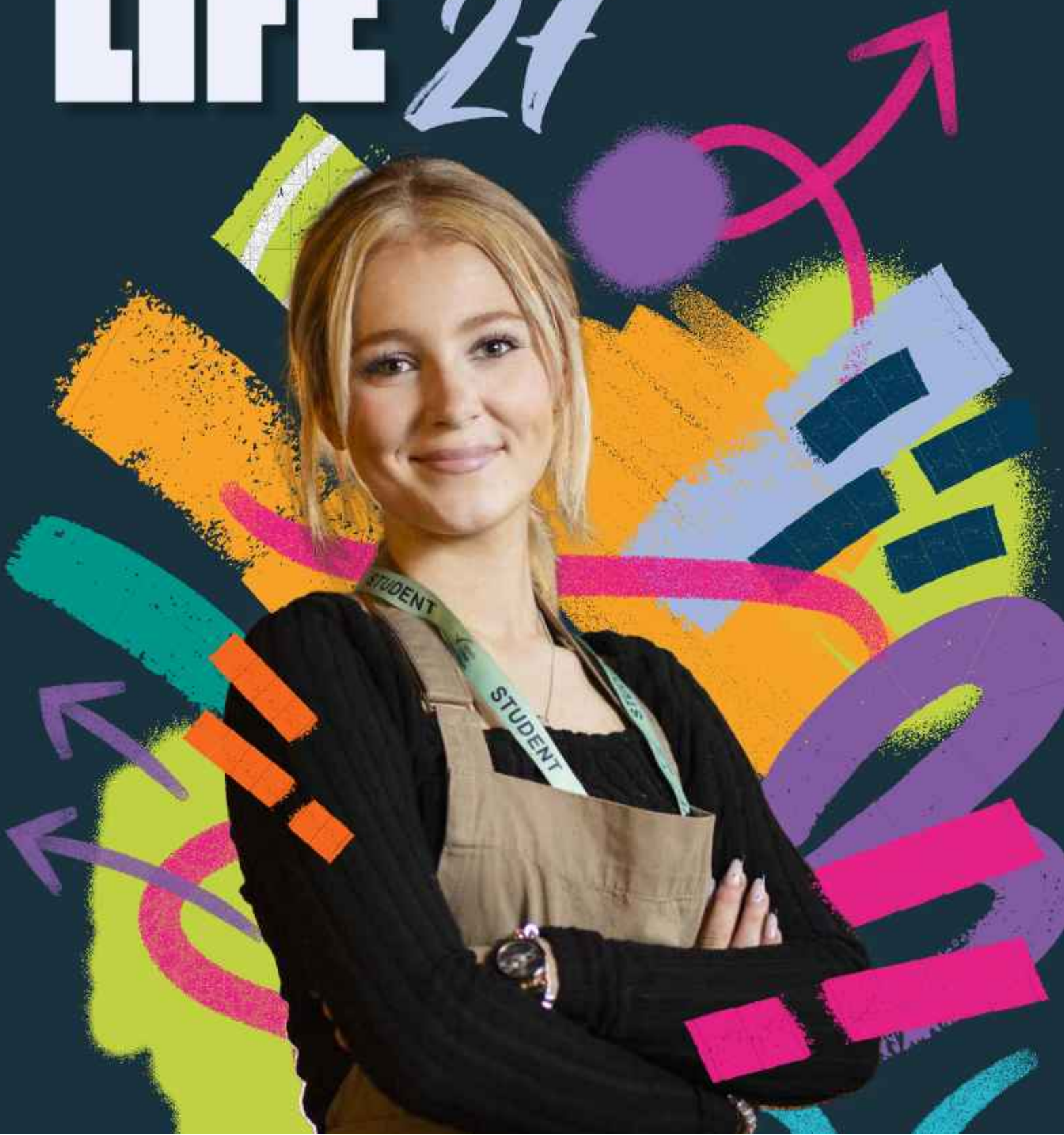

WHAT IS A COLLEGE?

It sounds like a silly question, but some people aren't sure as teachers don't talk much about College in Schools

Colleges like Lincoln College, Newark College and the Air & Space Institute (ASI) are places where you can learn practical skills for work as part of qualifications like BTECs, as well as more traditional qualifications like A Levels and now the new T Levels.

At College, we call our teachers 'lecturers', and many of them have worked in the industry they teach for many years. Even our A level lecturers tend to have more industry experience than teachers in most schools.

Many of our students progress from their level two and three courses into apprenticeships, where they are employed by a company while they continue to learn new skills and gain higher qualifications.

A number of our students often progress to university, as our practical qualifications and the new T Levels are the equivalent of A Levels and gain you UCAS points to go to University if you want to.

Perhaps the most important thing you need to know is that this is an equally valuable route into your chosen career as Sixth Forms and Universities.

In fact, a lot of our students go on to earn really good money in stable careers more quickly than young people who take the more traditional route.

So, College is right for some people and Sixth Form is right for others, but don't feel pressured into picking one over the other by the people around you.

Take your time, read our student guides like this one, make sure you visit all of the places you are considering, and make the right choice for you.

GCSES DONE: NOW WHAT?

There are lots of options open to you after your exams – all are valid and all can lead to a great career – it's just about finding the right fit for you.

Didn't quite get the grades you were hoping for?

Don't worry - we will support you in obtaining your goals or finding a path that suits your situation to kick-start your further education journey. It is very common for students to not achieve the desired GCSE English and/or Maths grades.

For these students, we offer Level 1 or 2 programmes alongside opportunities to resit their English and/or Maths exams. Once the necessary grades have been achieved, progression opportunities to more specialised Level 3 programmes become available. Rest assured, we will get you there!

University Progression

Your main choices are A Levels, Technical Training, Specialist Programmes, T Levels, Supported Education and Apprenticeships. It's important to point out that none of these pathways cancel each other out. For example, you don't need to complete A Levels to enter university. Many of our students complete Level 2 and Level 3 technical qualifications and then proceed to university, as they also carry UCAS points, like A Levels.

While Apprenticeships typically do not carry UCAS points unless they include a technical qualification, it is possible to undertake a foundation course for a year and then progress to university.

Straight into employment

If your goal is to enter the workforce sooner, technical qualifications might be the right choice for you. Many of our learners find themselves earning a good income in their chosen careers faster than their peers who opted for university.

NIAMH BOYFIELD

TECHNICAL TRAINING

Niamh, a former Health and Social Care student at Lincoln College, is now in the first year of her Adult Nursing degree at the University of Lincoln. Her journey reflects resilience, determination, and the positive impact of tailored support and clear progression pathways in education.

Niamh joined Lincoln College at the age of 14 after struggling in a traditional school environment. She began on the Skills for Health and Social Care course, an entry-level programme designed to help learners take their first steps into the sector. She then progressed to a one-year Level 1 course in Childcare and Health and Social Care, having already identified an interest in nursing or social work.

During this time, Niamh faced personal challenges and took a year out of education, working as a waitress after entering kinship care. Despite this setback, she remained focused on her long-term goals and returned to college to study Level 2 Health and Social Care. Alongside her course, she worked hard to improve her Maths, undertaking one-to-one tutoring. Although she initially struggled, including completing her GCSEs online during the Covid-19 pandemic and not passing, she later achieved success through a Functional Skills qualification.

Niamh progressed onto the Level 3 Health and Social Care course, where she adapted to a more academic style of learning, including research and referencing. She also completed 175 hours of placement, gaining valuable experience in care home settings, which strengthened her passion for the sector.

Niamh described the second year of Level 3 as her most challenging, balancing academic pressure with uncertainty about her future. However, her determination led to offers from five universities. She ultimately chose to study Adult Nursing at the University of Lincoln's Mansfield campus, a route that suited her ambitions.

Now pursuing a stable and rewarding career, Niamh is passionate about science-based roles and is committed to succeeding. She has since returned to Lincoln College as a guest speaker, inspiring current students by sharing her journey and demonstrating that with perseverance, long-term goals can be achieved.

Supported by award-winning celebrity hair stylist Lee Stafford, this study programme gets young people work-ready for the hairdressing and

barbering industry. Lee Stafford and his team train our staff and students in the latest styling, cutting and colouring techniques in special masterclasses throughout the year. Our students also work in our city centre finishing school Salon – Aura.

Lincoln School of Food and Hospitality

This centre of excellence trains young people for roles in cheffing, front of house, barista work, mixology, hospitality management, and event management. Our students can work in our finishing schools; Sessions Restaurant, The Old Bakery restaurant and The Drill.

The Care College

There are two care routes: one covers health and social care broadly, including residential care and social work; the other focuses on adult nursing via our T Level in our onsite simulated hospital ward. Both provide strong pathways into the health and care sector.

THE DRILL

When The Drill Hall went into administration during the pandemic, Lincoln College stepped in - and invested £1m in a refit, relaunching it as The Drill, a live music and comedy venue that also delivers events, weddings and exhibitions. The Drill is now a fantastic training ground for our Performing Arts, Production Arts, Lincoln School of Food and Hospitality, and Events Management students - giving them a real taste of high-pressure, large-scale productions and events.

THE LEE STAFFORD ACADEMY AND AURA

Our brand-new hair courses are delivered in partnership with Lee Stafford Education. The stylist to the stars has trained our staff and co-designed the curriculum to prepare you to operate at the highest level. Celebrity Lee Stafford will visit you several times with his team to deliver training sessions and talk to you about how to build a successful career.

We have also opened a stylish new salon in Lincoln City Centre called Aura, where our Level 3 students train and work with customers in a live commercial environment - this helps students develop their customer service skills and work to the highest standards for paying customers.

MADDY INGHAM

SCHOOL OF FOOD & HOSPITALITY

When Maddy Ingham joined Lincoln College in September 2024 to study Level 2 Professional Cookery, she set out to develop her skills and gain hands-on experience in the hospitality industry.

Less than two years later, she is preparing to take the next step in her career after securing a bursary package worth £19,000 to study at the Artisan School of Food & Hospitality.

After progressing onto the Level 3 Professional Cookery course, based at the college's on-campus Sessions Restaurant, Maddy has continued to build her confidence and experience in professional kitchen settings. Throughout her studies, she has worked on developing her own menus and has taken responsibility for running kitchen service at Sessions Restaurant as part of her training.

Alongside her studies, Maddy completed work experience at the college's finishing school restaurant, The Old Bakery, allowing her to further refine her skills in a different kitchen environment and gain valuable industry insight.

Her dedication and progress were recognised in October 2025 when she became a finalist in the Young Chef of the Year competition. Maddy took part in a three-course cook-off alongside some of Lincolnshire's emerging culinary talent and later attended the Lincolnshire Life Taste of Excellence Awards 2025 at the college-owned Drill Hall with fellow students Harry Lee and Lucie Cairns.

As part of the catering programme at Lincoln College, students also visit the Artisan School of Food & Hospitality each year to experience specialist training.

During a visit in April 2025, Maddy and her classmates developed their sourdough baking skills by creating baguettes and flavoured loaves, while also learning butchery techniques, added-value preparation, and cooking over fire.

Following these experiences, Maddy has now secured a place on the BSc (Hons) Artisan Food Production degree at the Artisan School of Food. She has been awarded a Barbara Curtis Trust bursary covering £15,000 in tuition fees, alongside an additional £4,000 towards accommodation costs.

Maddy's journey reflects the opportunities available to students through Lincoln College's catering courses, combining practical learning, industry experience and progression opportunities to help students build successful careers in hospitality.

Toyosi started his journey on the Level 2 Space & Engineering programme, Toyosi then progressed to specialise on the Level 3 Military & Defence Pilot pathway, wrapping up his studies at ASI in June 2026

Since December 2025 he has been going through the application process with the RAF. With plenty of base visits, sim time at college and PT sessions to keep his fitness up for the military and support from ex-military lecturers.

Toyosi passed his CBAT exam in April 2026 with his medical right around the corner, he will be in good chances in joining the RAF soon.

At the beginning of her studies, Freya enrolled on the one-year Level 2 Hairdressing course. This progression allowed her to refine her strengths and gain a deeper understanding of professional salon standards.

STUDYING A LEVELS

We have a great range of A Level subjects, from which you need to choose three subjects

The A Level pathway is designed for 16-18 year olds wishing to study full time and progress to Higher Education or employment. You need to apply to one of the A Levels you are interested in. On the application form it will ask you to enter the other A Levels you would like to apply for.

Our experienced subject specialists make supporting you in your learning journey a priority. You will study 3 subjects, with lessons across the week, and be part of a group tutorial alongside other students with similar interests to yourself. As well as gaining academic support from each of your subject teachers, you will be assigned a Progress Coach to guide you in applications to Higher Education and support your progress.

There are 21 subject choices which can be chosen in any combination of 3. For many subjects you will take the AS Level in the first year, giving you valuable examination practice and UCAS points, before moving on to the full A Level in the second year. For those subjects described as linear you will study the full two year A Level only.

Johanna joined Lincoln College in September 2025 from Sørumsand videregående skole in Norway, just outside Oslo. Studying in England for one academic year, she has taken A Levels in Sociology, English Language and Religious Studies, alongside additional studies in History and Spanish, and has successfully completed Maths.

Adapting to a new education system, Johanna found the experience both challenging and rewarding. She noted that studying three A Levels in depth is more intensive than the broader curriculum in Norway. However, this has enabled her to deepen her subject knowledge, particularly in areas she enjoys, such as ethics in Religious Studies and language and gender in English. These subjects have helped strengthen her grammar and communication skills.

Reflecting on her time at college, Johanna spoke positively about the quality of teaching and the supportive environment. She feels her experience in Lincoln has provided a strong academic foundation and is now considering extending her studies in English when she returns to Norway.

Living with a host family near Waddington has been an important part of Johanna's journey. She describes it as a safe and supportive environment that has encouraged her to become more independent and take on greater responsibility, helping her to develop valuable life skills.

Outside of her studies, Johanna has embraced new experiences, including trips to London and York, and is planning to visit Paris with a friend she met at college. She will also celebrate Norway's National Day in London, maintaining a connection to home while studying abroad.

As she prepares to return to Norway, Johanna reflects on her time at Lincoln College with mixed emotions. While she is unsure of her future career path, she plans to progress to university, equipped with the confidence, skills and experiences gained during her year in the UK.

About T Levels

- T Levels are a brand new, 2 year qualification that you can do as an alternative to A Levels, other post 16 courses or an apprenticeship. They bring classroom learning and an extended industry placement together on a course designed with businesses and employers.
- T Levels are ideal if you have finished your GCSEs and want the knowledge and experience to get straight into employment, an apprenticeship or Higher Education. You'll spend 80% of your time in the classroom and 20% on a 45 day placement with an employer to give you the skills and knowledge companies look for.

Why choose T Levels?

A T Level is a nationally recognised qualification that is worth the same number of UCAS points as 3 A Levels.

Endorsed by businesses, they include a 45 day industry placement to help you learn what a real career is like.

- T Level students will have an extra hour in their weekly schedule for EEP sessions (employment, enrichment, pastoral) throughout year 1 and 2 to develop their employability skills further. Students will also have an employer project which combines observations on industry placements and theoretical knowledge acquired from classes.

Will's hard work and commitment were recognised at the Lincoln College Further Education Awards 2026, where he received the T Level Award for his outstanding achievements and contribution to the programme.

Throughout his studies, Will consistently impressed staff with both his academic ability and his natural aptitude for engineering. Tutors described his "mechanical sympathy" as a standout quality, highlighting his ability to understand complex systems instinctively and approach every workshop session with the mindset of a professional engineer. Calm under pressure and highly methodical, he excelled during practical diagnostic tasks,

often identifying faults quickly and accurately while maintaining high standards of safety and workmanship.

One of his most notable achievements came during a recent project in which he managed a complex installation from the design stage through to final testing. His attention to detail and commitment to quality ensured the project was completed successfully and to an exceptional standard.

Alongside his technical skills, Will became a valued member of the engineering department thanks to his positive attitude, reliability and willingness to support others.

He regularly helped classmates with practical problems and theory work, often mentoring peers who were struggling with particular concepts. His enthusiasm for engineering extended beyond his coursework, with Will frequently taking on additional projects such as manufacturing replacement parts for college workshop machinery and developing resources to support learning activities.

Will's industry placement at a local mechanics and fabrication garage proved equally successful. The placement, which ended in July 2025, led to him being offered a job before he had even completed the course, and he continues to work there today.

Our Supported Education department ensures that students receive the necessary support, specialist equipment, and adapted resources.

A dedicated team of specialists assesses the support needs of learners and coordinates appropriate arrangements, such as exam access arrangements, for students with special educational needs, disabilities, or health conditions.

We offer a wide range of courses designed to provide additional support and learning opportunities, tailored to prepare students for their chosen careers. These individualised study programmes focus on developing practical skills across a variety of areas. Supported Education courses are offered at Entry Level, meaning you do not need any previous qualifications to enrol. While on the programme, students can work towards achieving GCSE English and/or Maths. Many of our Supported Education students go on to progress to mainstream Level 1, 2, and 3 courses.

To mark the end of the academic year, students from across our Supported Education provision came together to host a wonderful end-of-year event, welcoming friends, family, and college staff while raising money for the Nomad Trust.

SUPPORTED EDUCATION

Reece, a Supported Intern at Lincoln College, is building valuable industry experience through hands-on learning and work placements in the automotive sector.

Through tailored support and practical opportunities, the Supported Education programmes can help students progress towards their long-term career goals.

Reece first joined Lincoln College in 2021, beginning his studies on the Level 1 Sport course before moving onto Level 1 Multi Skills. During this time, he realised he wanted to pursue a career working with cars, but initially did not have the grades required to enter the automotive industry pathway.

With support from the college, Reece was able to progress onto the Level 1 Automotive Engineering course, where he developed his technical knowledge and practical skills. He later advanced onto the Supported Internship programme, which gave him the opportunity to gain real-world experience in a professional motorsport environment.

As part of his Supported Internship, Reece secured a placement with Gridline Racing, working as a race marshal and mechanic. In this role, he helps monitor races to ensure customers are staying safe and using the vehicles correctly, while also supporting with maintenance tasks such as fixing kart brakes and preparing vehicles for use.

The placement has allowed him to build confidence, improve his teamwork skills, and gain valuable insight into the day-to-day responsibilities within the motorsport industry.

Alongside his internship, Reece also works part-time at Garage KW Services, where he has had the opportunity to shadow experienced mechanics and further develop his understanding of the automotive trade. His long-term ambition is to secure a full-time role within the industry and continue building his career working with vehicles.

STUDYING APPRENTICESHIPS

Apprenticeships are a great way to get on the career ladder, so you can start earning cash while you train and gain your independence quicker

What is an Apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a paid job that allows you to gain valuable skills, experience and qualifications while you work. Alongside your day-to-day role, you will complete off-the-job training in line with the requirements of your Apprenticeship Standard.

Apprenticeships last a minimum of eight months and combine practical, hands-on experience with structured learning. As an apprentice, you earn a salary while developing the knowledge, skills and behaviours needed for your chosen career. As part of an apprenticeship, you are required to complete a set number of off-the-job training hours. The number of training hours varies depending on the apprenticeship programme and qualification level, and may be delivered through a combination of college-based learning, workplace training and independent study.

An Apprenticeship includes:

- Earning a wage and receiving holiday pay
- Working alongside experienced professionals
- Developing job-specific skills and knowledge
- Gaining hands-on experience in your chosen industry

- Dedicated time for training and study related to your role
- Developing English and maths skills where required
- Formal assessment leading to a nationally recognised qualification

Apprenticeships are a cost-effective way to start a new career or retrain later in life, allowing you to earn while you learn. They can be particularly beneficial if you have taken time away from work to raise a family or for health-related reasons and are looking to refresh your skills and confidence.

Apprenticeships are not just for people entering the workplace for the first time. If you are already employed and want to develop your skills, progress within your organisation or move into a more senior role, an apprenticeship could help you achieve your career goals. If this is something you are interested in doing the 1st step would be speaking to your employer.

What Levels can I do?

- Intermediate Apprenticeship (Level 2)
- Advanced Apprenticeship (Level 3)
- Higher and Degree Apprenticeships (Levels 4, 5, 6 and 7)

While apprenticeships remain a popular option for 16 to 18-year-olds looking to learn a trade or begin a profession, they are also available at higher and degree levels. These programmes provide opportunities for experienced professionals, managers and senior leaders to develop advanced skills and gain recognised qualifications.

What if I'm in My Final Year at School?

If you are in your final year of school, start exploring apprenticeship vacancies on our website from March of your final year. Our team can support you in searching for apprenticeship opportunities.

As young people must remain in education or training until the age of 18, we also recommend applying for a full-time course in a related subject. If you express an interest in apprenticeships on your application, we can help you search for suitable opportunities while you study, allowing you to transfer onto an apprenticeship as soon as the right position becomes available.

APPRENTICESHIPS

Former Property Maintenance Operative Apprentice Caitlin Morley is now thriving in her role at Platform Housing Group, demonstrating the impact apprenticeships at Lincoln College can have in shaping careers and building confidence.

After completing sixth form, Caitlin began a university course in product design but soon realised it was not the right fit. A near miss with an application to the police service left her reconsidering her options, before discovering the Property Maintenance Operative apprenticeship that would ultimately change her direction.

Initially, Caitlin found the experience challenging. Entering a male-dominated trade felt daunting, and she struggled with consistent college attendance. However, through hands-on experience in domestic settings, she developed both her technical skills and customer service abilities, gradually growing in confidence and commitment to her career.

Caitlin said: "I didn't think it was for me at first, but after one day working with a plumber, I loved it and secured one of the two apprenticeship places. It changed everything. I'm where I'm meant to be."

Since starting her apprenticeship in October 2024 with Platform Housing Group and Lincoln College, Caitlin has achieved her Property Maintenance Operative qualification and key health and safety accreditations.

Her progress has led to her advancement into an Apprentice Heating Engineer role, where she now supports boiler installations and works directly with customers, including vulnerable residents, demonstrating professionalism beyond her years.

With continued support from her employer, Caitlin is now planning to complete a Level 3 qualification in plumbing and heating and hopes to expand her expertise into oil-fired systems, highlighting her clear ambition for the future.

As an employer-led institution, we collaborate with local businesses

This year, students refined their sourdough skills by handcrafting baguettes and house-flavoured loaves, while also furthering their learning in butchery techniques and cooking over fire.

Working on the theme of space, students transformed their ideas from mood boards into striking, fully realised looks. Alongside her GCSEs, Alex studied for her Level 2 Introduction to Sport and Leisure qualification, achieving a Distinction. In September 2024, she progressed to the Level 3 Policing qualification at Lincoln College and completed her studies in June 2026, scooping the 2026 Policing & Protective Services Award at the Further Education Awards Ceremony. Alex will begin her career as a Police Constable with Derbyshire Police later in 2026.

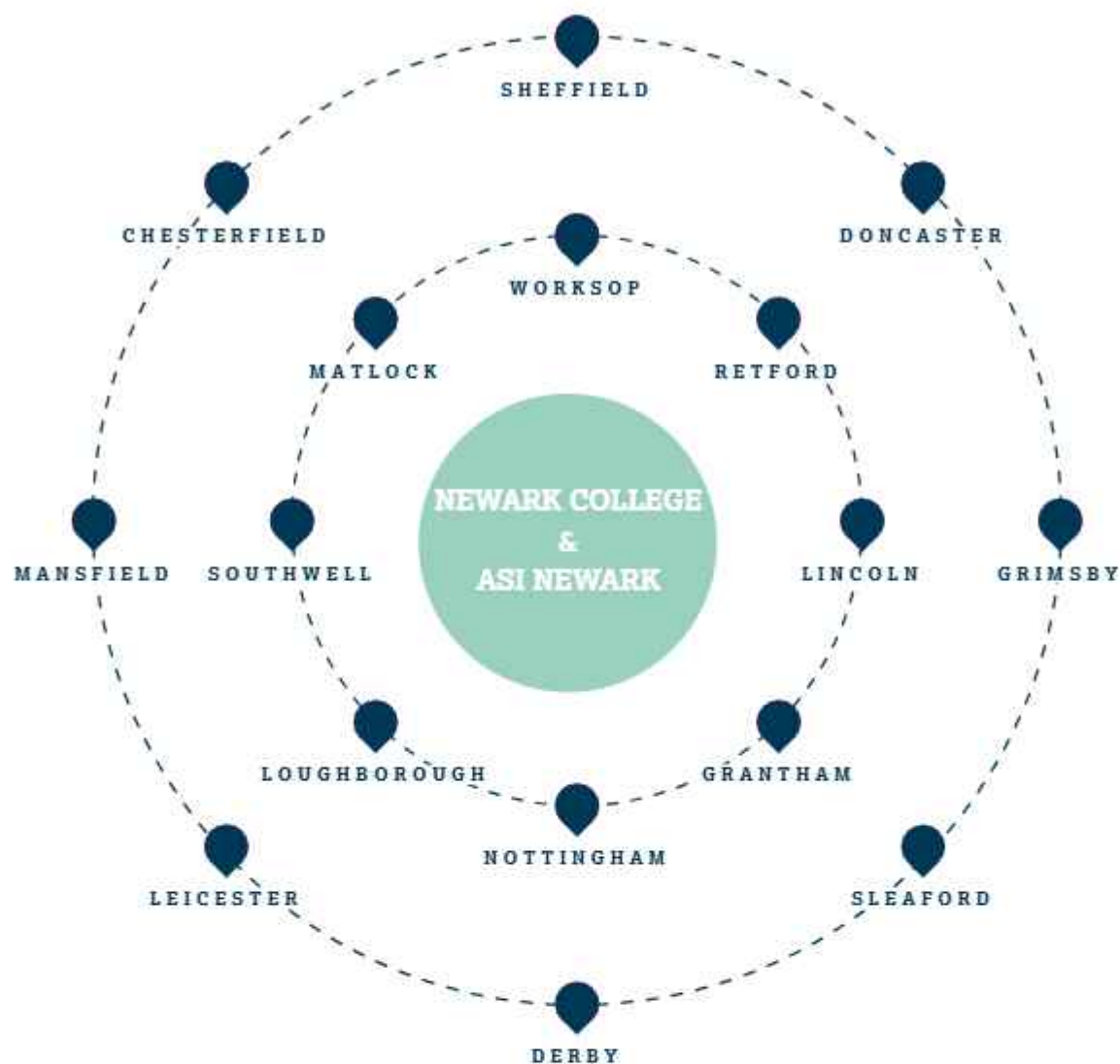

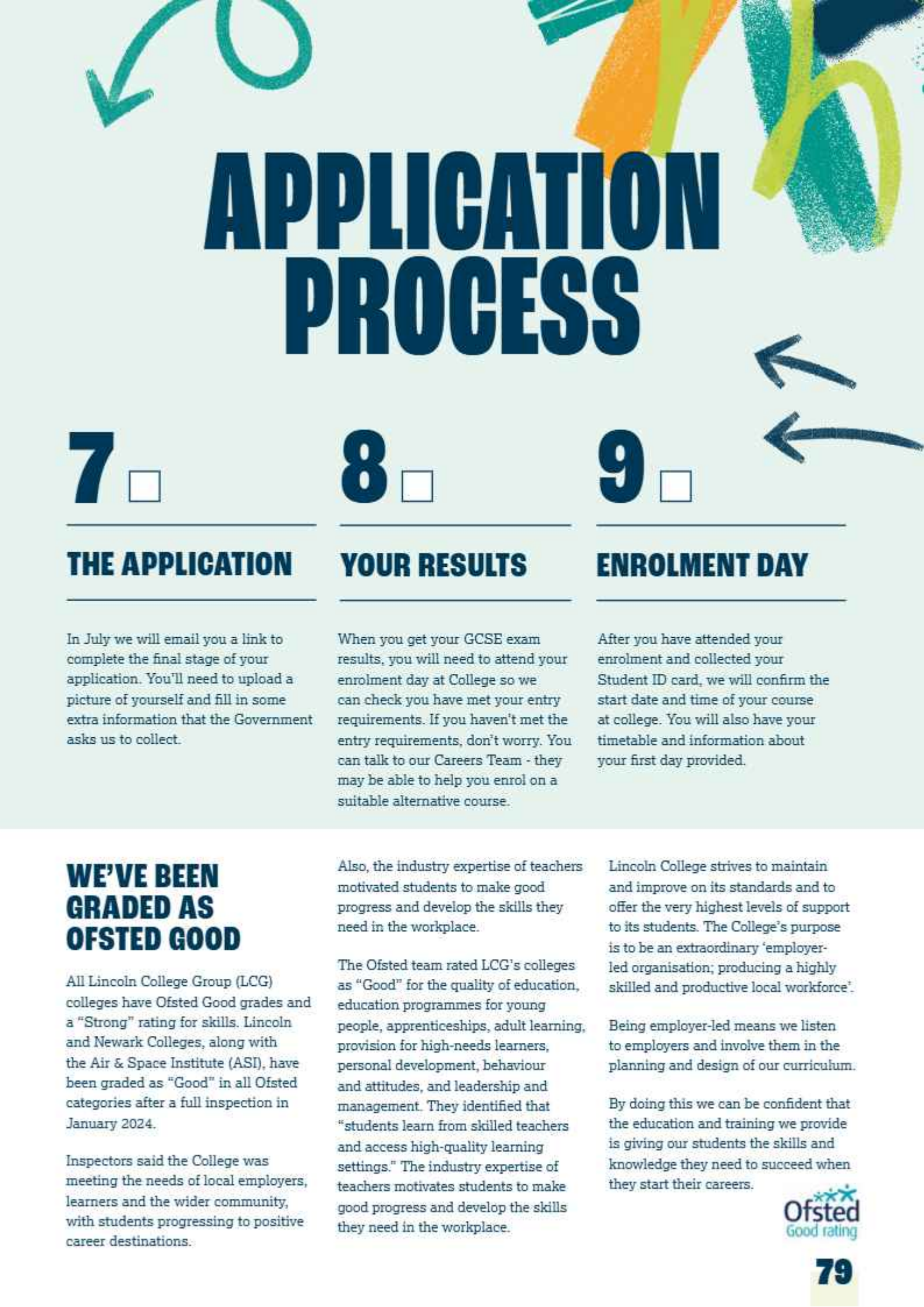
